What is Revolutionary Stories?

An initiative to gather, record, interpret, and share both well-known and underrepresented stories about the people, places, events, and objects that relate to the period before, during, and after the American Revolution within the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area.

Why now?

America250, a multi-year effort to commemorate the semiquincentennial—or **250**th **anniversary**—of the United States, is underway! The commemoration period began in 2020, culminates on **July 4**th, **2026**, and officially concludes in 2027.

Revolutionary Stories provides an opportunity for municipalities and organizations to develop programming, projects, and heritage tourism itineraries and resources to engage residents and visitors in the forthcoming celebrations with guidance and financial support from the Freedom's Way NHA.

Goals of the Initiative

- Engage stakeholders from the Heritage Area's 45 communities.
- Explore new ideas and perspectives to "<u>tell the full American Story</u>," drawing inspiration from and building upon the history of the Revolutionary War era.
- **Empower individuals and organizations** to research, record, and contribute stories within a shared framework; provide resources to support their work.
- Create a publicly accessible online repository of collected stories that can inform the creation of programs, projects, and heritage tourism itineraries and resources to engage residents and visitors leading up to, and beyond, 2026.





The Repository

- Is a **publicly accessible, web-based museum** of the region.
- Its collection includes entries—crafted as stories—about people/groups,
 places/locations, objects/things, and events associated with the American Revolution.
- Will remain **permanently available** through the Freedom's Way NHA website following the conclusion of the America250 commemoration period.
- Integrates place-based entries with the website's <u>interactive map</u> and <u>mobile</u>
 <u>app</u> for an enhanced user experience.

Ebenezer Locke

Ebenezer Locke of Woburn, Massachusetts fought at Concord and Lexington on April 19, 1775. Persistent rumor had it, starting in the early 1800s, that he was the one who fired the "first shot" made famous by Ralph Waldo Emerson in his 1836 poem, "Concord Hymn."

Reverend Willard Hall was born in Medford, Massachusetts in 1703. He was married to Abigail Cotton (1705-1789) and had eleven children. A 1722 Harvard College graduate, he came to Westford, Massachusetts in the summer of 1726.

Abner Hosmer Powder Horn

CONCORD MUSEUM, CONCORD, MA


On April 10, 1775, Jonathan Hosmer of Acton wrote a letter reporting that "There came a post to Concord a Saterday [sic] night which enforms [sic] them that the Regulars are coming up to Concord." He predicted that "if they come I believe there will be bloody work." The post rider Hosmer mentioned was Paul Revere who rode to Concord on a false alarm. Nine days later Hosmer's son Abner was killed in the first firing at the North Bridge.



How can YOU contribute during this phase?

- Compile lists/inventories
 - Muster rolls, gravesites, extant historic structures, etc.
- Digitize/transcribe documents
 - Diaries, Town Meeting minutes, correspondence, etc.
- Research items/topics of interest to you or your organization/community.

- Write descriptions/stories about people, places, things, and events to be added directly into the Repository.
- Photograph sites in the landscape or items in collections that may accompany stories to be written.
- Discover underrepresented subjects and/or themes to explore.





Next Steps

- 1. <u>Check the Repository</u>—What's already there?
- 2. Start a list of the "low-hanging fruit,"—What do you already know?
 - What items and documents are in your collection?
 - What historic sites/structures are in your community?
 - Who were the key figures in your community (i.e., local/military/religious leaders; prominent families; business owners, etc.)
 - What important events took place in or affected your community?
- 3. Determine how you'd like to share this information through *Revolutionary Stories* and what resources, if any, you'd need to make that happen.
- 4. Let us know you're ready to **get started!**






Next Steps


How can the information collected be used by community partners?


- To develop commemorative projects and programs such as exhibits, tours, presentations, and quests.

Coordinate Social Media Campaigns




