

2021-2022 Years in Review



If it appears the last two years have passed in a blur...

...THEY HAVE! And while we have been acclimating to the changes wrought by the ongoing impacts of Covid, as an organization we have used this time to grow and adapt while continuing to advance the mission, vision and goals set out in the organization's management plan, approved by the US Secretary of the Interior in July of 2015.

Since then, the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area has accessed more than \$1,600,000 in federal financial assistance and leveraged \$1.95 of non-federal match for every dollar of financial assistance accessed. With this funding, the Freedom's Way Heritage Association—the coordinating entity for the heritage area—has collaborated with nearly 1,300 partners.

It is these partners we continue to support.

During the past two years our enhanced grant program has committed a minimum of 10% of our annual NPS funding allocation and been reconfigured to include an emphasis on inclusive storytelling. *Revolutionary* Stories: The Enduring Legacies of the American Revolution in the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area, has provided a shared forum for the region to commemorate the 250th founding of our nation. Hidden Treasures, reimagined as a month-long festival of virtual and in-person programs has continued to showcase the natural, cultural, and historical treasures of our partners. And a study of conserved land in the region has underscored our commitment to conservation and stewardship.

Most significantly, we also completed one of our most ambitious undertakings yet—the rebranding of Freedom's Way National Heritage Area and the creation of a robust interactive website to serve as an online museum of the region. Designed to be engaging and accessible to diverse audiences, our new website and accompanying mobile app allows the user to explore the region by experience, theme, topic, and location.

We are pleased to report on our progress during the past two years and look forward to working with you in 2023. We hope you will join us as we continue to connect the 45 communities of the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area and share the themes, stories, people, and places that make this region unique.



* Freedom's Way National Heritage Area Act of 2021

On December 8, 2021, Senator Edward J. Markey (D-Mass.), Senator Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.), and Congresswoman Lori Trahan (MA-03) introduced the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area Act of 2021, legislation that would eliminate the total funding cap for the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area and extend its authorization to 2036.

Designated by Congress in 2009, Freedom's Way's authorization expires on March 30, 2024. Without reauthorization we will be unable to access the remaining funds allocated in the original legislation.

We are one of 45 National Heritage Areas scheduled to sunset in 2022, 2023 and 2024. A uniform program bill, S. 1942, the National Heritage Area Act, that would extend sunsets for all and develop uniform and consistent guidelines for the National Heritage Area Program was reported out of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee in May 2022. The bill must pass before the 117th Congress adjourns.

Introducing Our New Logo & Brand


Collaborative, Community-focused, Welcoming, Innovative are some of the words stakeholders used to describe Freedom's Way during the rebranding process.

In the fall of 2020 as the first phase of an ambitious redesign of our website, the organization explored the creation of a new identity to express the diversity of the histories, stories, and people important to the area and be inclusive and welcoming of everyone.

The goals of the brand refresh and new website included raising awareness about the organization and the heritage area, especially among younger generations and new residents, clarifying the intent of the organization's name, refreshing the messaging, and designing an intuitive and interactive guide and online archive.

The choice of a vibrant purple, a modern and open typeface and a new logo set the intent. The logo's elements, an abstraction of a banner/flag and a beacon/lantern, combine to create a strong visual mark that is a unique symbol of the area without referencing an individual object or place.

Amos Fortune—Woburn

A survivor of the trans-continental slave trade, Amos Fortune (c.1740-1801) purchased his freedom while living in Woburn, MA becoming a prominent tanner, bookbinder, and philanthropist. Upon relocating to Jaffrey, NH, Fortune became the town's first benefactor, establishing what would evolve into the Amos Fortune Fund, administered by the Jaffrey Public Library.



Maria Moreira—Lancaster

An Azorean immigrant, Maria Moreira nurtures community through agriculture. As a founder of Flats Mentor Farm and World Farmers in Lancaster, MA, Moreira assists refugee and immigrant farmers in establishing successful businesses, building upon the region's rich agricultural heritage.



Freeman Tilden—Malden

Deemed the father of heritage interpretation, Malden native Freeman Tilden (1883-1980) greatly influenced the development of the National Park Service. His principles and theories of park interpretation have inspired generations of interpreters across the world and his book *Interpreting Our Heritage* remains a definitive text for the discipline.


Featured Projects

The Enduring Legacies of the American Revolution in the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area

We are a region of small towns and independent minds. We are stronger when we respect our differences and work together. One individual or town didn't start the American revolution or build democracy, we came together as interdependent towns and people to create a country built on shared ideals and individual freedoms.

As we prepare for the 250th anniversary commemoration of our nation's founding we are undertaking a region-wide initiative to gather, record, interpret and share both well-known and underrepresented stories about the people, places, events, and objects that relate to the periods before, during and after the American Revolution in the region.

Revolutionary Stories: The Enduring Legacies of the American Revolution in the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area will bring awareness to the diverse perspectives, inequities, and experiences of those who lived within the 45 communities that now comprise the Heritage Area during this complex period of history.

During the past year a framework for gathering and sharing stories was created along with a community partners guide. These have been field tested by the Westford Historical Society and Museum. Introductory discussions have been held with eleven historical organizations to solicit feedback. A series of webinars this fall on research techniques featured public historian Mary Fuhrer and LexSeeHer.

Stories are available on a publicly accessible, free, interactive online repository housed on our website. These will be used to inform collaborative programming, projects, and itineraries that engage new audiences in the story of the American Revolution and its enduring impacts on the social and cultural fabric of our country.



Stories shared through this initiative are accessible to the public via a dynamic relational database on the Freedom's Way website. Entries are categorized by type, location and theme and the use of tags further links related stories to each other for an enhanced browsing experience. Entries that are place-based are integrated with the website's interactive mapping tool and associated mobile app, allowing users to build travel itineraries which can be accessed from multiple electronic devices and shared with others.

Hidden Treasures Festival of Nature, Culture & History


Building upon the successes of Hidden Treasures' 5th Anniversary in 2019, and following a one-year hiatus in 2020, our signature program returned in 2021 as the Hidden Treasures Festival of Nature, Culture & History—a month-long festival featuring an immersive mixture of online and physical events and activities showcasing the landscape, traditions, and stories of the Heritage Area.

A desire to reconnect with our partners and community members prompted us to venture into the world of virtual programming. We organized three, two-part webinar series showcasing the innovative work of our partners in the months leading up to the 2021 Festival. Additionally, we hosted a weekly online speaker series, "Exploring Nature in the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area," featuring four experts who live and work in the Heritage Area.

Despite the ongoing challenges of the pandemic during these two years, nearly 60 partners found creative ways to host in-person, online, and self-guided programs and activities, representing more than half of the Heritage Area's 45 communities.



Conserved Lands Mapping Project



The communities within the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area have played an important role in shaping American ideas and actions through conservation initiatives, spanning multiple centuries. From the town commons of the earliest English settlers to the establishment of one of the nation's first land trusts, the region has been at the forefront of protecting and preserving land for public use and as a legacy for future generations.

In 2014, as part of the management planning process, Washington University mapped the amount of conserved land in the heritage area (24.92%). Working with Fitchburg State University in 2021, we updated that work to discover that 27.51% of the heritage area's is conserved, a 2.59% increase.

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A Word About 2023



Revolutionary War Monument & Memorial Survey

There are more than two hundred Revolutionary War related monuments and memorials within the heritage area. This survey will provide information about the origin, location, and story behind each, informing dialogue about commemoration and memorialization as we plan for the nation's semiquincentennial.



Interpretive Sites Survey

Building upon research completed for a 2018 National Historic Landmarks survey of the heritage area, the Interpretive Sites Survey will identify historic landscapes, communities, sites, and stories within a thematic framework to support the creation of interpretation projects, the development of preservation strategies and to further develop an online museum of the region.



Operation Pollination

An inclusive partnership endeavor, Operation Pollination, supports the creation of an interconnected mosaic of pollinator habitat on public and private land to stabilize and/or increase populations of pollinator species throughout the region. Webinars and small grants will support heritage area communities in this work.
