

## **Reflecting** on the Past; Looking to the Future

Eight years ago, the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area Management Plan was approved by the Secretary of the Interior. Laying out an agenda of 228 action items to be achieved within a tenyear timeframe, the plan articulated the mission, vision, goals, and guiding principles that would shape the organization's future work and serve as a benchmark for evaluation.

More than significant progress has been made in fulfilling the ambitious goals and objectives set forth in 2015. The heritage area is a catalyst for communication and collaboration that is deeply invested in the communities we serve. As a positive force for creative partnerships and entrepreneurial endeavors, in 2023 we worked with 85 organizations and engaged more than 750 individuals throughout the region.

While expanding upon our mandate to curate the region as a 'manager of the experience of place,' Freedom's Way continues to gather, organize, and provide access to information about the people, places and objects in the heritage area that make it unique. Our emphasis on inclusive storytelling continues to grow and evolve as we embrace new perspectives and support new initiatives—including those related to the semiquincentennial.

We look forward to working with you in the coming year as we 'discover the Revolution anew' and explore the enduring legacies of the American Revolution in the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area. With a dual focus on commemoration and memorialization, How We Remember is surveying the Revolutionary War Monuments, Memorials and Markers within the region to encourage dialogue about who is remembered and how. Our Revolutionary Stories Podcast Series continues to uncover seldom told stories and connect them to historic places you can visit to provide a comprehensive and authentic historical narrative from a new perspective.

Thank you for partnering with us and contributing to our success. We are grateful for the partners, donors, volunteers, and friends who support our work and appreciate their dedication to our mission and vision.

Together, we can continue to make a lasting impact in the 45 communities within the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area.

# **Investing** in Our Communities

The **2023 Partnership Grant Program** awarded \$46,510 in support of 19 projects directly impacting more than one-third of the communities we serve. In turn, over \$522,000 was generated in matching in-kind contributions, leveraging NPS funding 11:1.

Designed to provide strategic investments in the natural, cultural and historical resources that enhance the sense of place within the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area, reimbursable matching grants are offered within the categories of:

- Historic Preservation;
- Education, Interpretation & Curation;
- Community Planning & Resource Conservation;
- Regional Cultural Events;
- Inclusive Storytelling; and
- Revolutionary Stories.

For the second year Freedom's Way set aside discrete

funding through the Partnership Grant Program to prioritize **Inclusive Storytelling** and **Revolutionary Stories** projects. These grants support research, documentation, and interpretation of stories that raise awareness of diverse perspectives and experiences; broaden the understanding of themes and stories relating to the American Revolution within the region; and provide insight into those whose stories have been excluded from the historical narrative.

**Inclusive Storytelling** grants support the creation of interpretive products, such as waysides, web content, videos and exhibits, oral histories, podcasts, blogs, and the development of programs that share these stories with the community.

**Revolutionary Stories** grants lay the foundation for future initiatives that will engage new audiences in the stories of the American Revolution and its enduring impacts on the social and cultural fabric of our nation.

# **Discovering** the Revolution Anew

As we prepare for the 250th anniversary commemoration of our nation's founding, Freedom's Way, with support from the Massachusetts Society of the Cincinnati and in partnership with the National Park Service and local communities, is undertaking a region-wide initiative to gather, record, interpret and share both well-known and underrepresented stories about the people, places, events and objects that relate to the periods before, during and after the American Revolution in the region.

Revolutionary Stories: The Enduring Legacies of the American Revolution in the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area brings awareness to the diverse perspectives, inequities and experiences of those who

lived within the 45 communities that now comprise the Heritage Area during this complex period of history.

Information developed through the project will be used to develop programming, projects and itineraries to engage new audiences in the story of the American Revolution and its enduring impacts on the social and cultural fabric of our nation.

### **How We Remember**

To provide a framework for exploring collective memory, memorialization and civic and social engagement, How We Remember: A Survey of Revolutionary War Monuments, Memorials and Markers within the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area is researching the history of the monuments, memorials, markers, and plaques within the Heritage Area with ties to the American Revolution. To date, more than one hundred have been identified, photographed and compiled into a preliminary document that places them within a historical context.

From the first Revolutionary War monument in the country, dedicated in Lexington, MA on July 4, 1799, through the Revolutionary War Memorial Drum Monument in Westford, MA dedicated on July 7, 2021, **How We Remember** provides an opportunity to reflect on who is memorialized in the Heritage Area and how, offering insight to our communities as planning for the upcoming semiquincentennial continues.



# REVOLUTIONARY STORIES Podcast Series

To raise awareness of the historical sites within the region with ties to the American Revolution and engage the public through storytelling, Freedom's Way has launched **Revolutionary Stories**, a collaborative history podcast.

Featured monthly in the e-newsletter and available on our website and the steaming service SoundCloud, each episode combines an introductory story with an onsite interview that provides a fresh perspective on how the place and story are interpreted today. The series will run throughout the year and include sites from throughout the region.

# **Cultivating** a Sense of Place

### **Wayfinding Signage Project**

Building upon the success of our new logo and brand, in 2023 work continued with Carlisle-based brand strategy and design agency D&CO on the development of a wayfinding and signage system for the region.

The project began with field visits to sites within the region to assess existing interpretive and directional signage, followed by a workshop to understand the Heritage Area's brand awareness and promotional needs. A competitive signage analysis was completed.

A wide range of signage options were developed, including a kiosk that could promote the regional work of the Heritage Area while being tailored to the needs of individual communities.

A prototype of the kiosk, presented at the 2023 Annual Meeting, will be refined and field tested in the coming year with a goal of having a final product to share with our community partners in the spring.

### **Interpretive Sites Survey**

Work has begun on an interpretive sites survey within the Heritage Area to explore and create new approaches for interpretation that focus on recognizing and supporting the interconnected character of the natural and cultural landscape of the region.

Divided into three independent phases, in its preliminary phase topics, historical themes and contexts were identified, reviewed, prioritized and placed within the framework of the three nationally important interpretive themes identified in the Freedom's Way National Heritage Area Management Plan. Individual studies of landscape elements and features were completed, and GIS mapping of built elements begun.

Extensive field work provided a greater understanding of the historical and landscape context of the region as well as the significance of the resources and sites identified through a preliminary landscape assessment.

Designed to strengthen the opportunities for interpretation, education and the preservation of the region's natural and cultural resources to enhance its sense of place, the project amplifies the value of the Heritage Area's important sites and stories within a national context.

### **Connecting Communities**


Following a two-year hiatus, Connecting Communities: Walks & Talks returned with the thematic focus "Operation Pollination."

### **Hidden Treasures**

Throughout the month of May, the Hidden Treasures Festival of Nature, Culture & History showcases events and activities hosted by local partners celebrating the unique places, objects, and stories of the Heritage Area. Hidden Treasures reinforces a shared regional identity and sense of place by encouraging people of all ages and walks of life to explore and see anew their own communities, and beyond.

This year more than 60 offerings were hosted by 65 partners in 32 of Heritage Area's 45 communities. Nearly a quarter of those partners were first-time participants.

### **Educational Opportunities Research**

Work is underway to research and assess the landscape of educational opportunities available to students and educators within the Heritage Area. The project was developed to inform preliminary next steps toward realizing a suite of action items focused on the following three key areas outlined in the Management Plan:

- 1. On-Site Programming for School Groups,
- 2. Teacher Network, Training and Engagement, and
- 3. Student Internships.

We have engaged Elisabeth Nevins, founder and principal of Seed/Ed, to consult on the project and look forward to sharing our findings in 2024.

# Working to Preserve Our Heritage

### **National Heritage Area Act of 2022**

On January 5, 2023, President Biden signed into law the National Heritage Area Act (S. 1942) creating standard criteria for the funding, management and designation of National Heritage Areas across the country. S. 1942 (now Public Law No. 117-339) provides an annual authorization of up to \$1 million per year for the next 15 years for each heritage area, subject to the federal appropriation process. It extends the authorization date of 45 heritage areas, including Freedom's Way, to 2036.

One of the last bills passed in the 117th Congress, the legislation was supported by a bi-partisan vote of 326-95 in the House after passing in the Senate unopposed. Massachusetts Congressman Jim McGovern, past Chair of the House Rules Committee, was instrumental in securing the passage of the rule needed to advance the

National Heritage Areas Act to the House Floor.

Along with Congressman McGovern, we are grateful to our Congressional Delegation and their staffs who worked tirelessly to secure the passage of the National Heritage Area Act of 2022, including Senators Ed Markey, Elizabeth Warren, Maggie Hassan and Jeanne Shaheen, and Representatives Katherine Clark, Lori Trahan, Seth Moulton and Annie Kuster.

Attesting to the popularity of the program nationally, S.1942 authorized seven new National Heritage Areas.


